Music at LaGrave

Homer Newton Bartlett (1845-1920) was a significant American composer of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. He is known for writing in various genres—both sacred and secular—including opera, orchestral, vocal, piano, and organ music. A founding member of the American Guild of Organists, Bartlett worked in two prominent New York City Protestant churches. His three-verse penitential vocal solo *O Lord, Be Merciful* features a recurring refrain, dramatic accompaniment, and contrasts in dynamic range, indicative of the style of much turn-of-the-century vocal music.

The flowers in the sanctuary are given in loving memory of **Dr. James Penning** by his wife **Marge**.
