Music at LaGrave (8:40)

The aria *I Will Sing of Thy Great Mercies* is an excerpt from the 1836 Oratorio *St. Paul* by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847). The text sung this morning, however, differs slightly from the Oratorio text and is from the pen of Lloyd Pfautsch, a musical editor, and partly inspired by Psalm 89:1. While the Oratorio text addresses God’s faithfulness, Pfautsch’s text focuses on God’s Word as truth.

The October special offering is for Next Step. Next Step is a faith-based nonprofit employing people coming out of prison or rehab and providing them with a community of support that will help them integrate into the workforce, regain hope, and empower themselves to create a better future.

This evening will be our Thirty-Third Annual Reformation Day Festival of Hymns. Our choir will sing, the Western Brass will be here, and we will praise God in a service centered on the "I Am's" of John. Reverend Jonker will preside over the service.
