Music at LaGrave:

Johann Gottfried Walther was a cousin of J. S. Bach and author of the first music dictionary. He wrote 14 choral partitas for organ based on well-known German chorales. Each variation of the Partita based on *Jesus, Priceless Treasure* displays a different organ sound and compositional style; the final variation is for full organ with the melody played in the foot pedals. Johann Crüger, a music publisher, compiler of a hymnal containing settings of all the Genevan Psalms, and strong advocate for congregational singing, is the composer of the 1653 chorale tune *Jesu, Meine Freude* (Jesus, Priceless Treasure), this morning's introtit.

The February special offering for the month is **Wedgwood Christian Services**. Wedgwood extends God's love to youth and families through professional counseling and educational services.

Banners: Purple is the color for the liturgical season of Lent. It symbolizes the suffering and sorrow of Jesus as he journeys to the cross. It also symbolizes the suffering of humanity and the world broken by sin. For Christians, this is

a time for self-examination, repentance, and renewal. In sorrow we confess our sins and call on God, in Christ, to save us.
