**The sanctuary colors of Christmas are white, purple, and gold.** White symbolizes the purity and holiness of Jesus Christ, Son of God. Yet, he is also Jesus Christ, born of a woman, being both God and human. As a human person, Jesus was like us in every respect except he was without sin. Therefore, he was able to take our sins upon himself and redeem us. Purple represents the birth of Jesus but also foreshadows his coming death. All of the colors combine against the background of gold. Gold represents the kingship of Jesus and also our joy and celebration of the Christmas season.

Our women’s trio is made up of LaGrave members **Glenda Buteyn and Jess Hollenbach**, who are joined by Jess’ mother, **Carole Medema**. We thank these singers for sharing their gifts on this Christmas Day.

### **Music at LaGrave:**

The rollicking African-American Spiritual *Jesus, What a Wonderful Child* expresses the joy of the Christmas Gift from a slave’s perspective. The coming of Christ, the Newborn King, brings us new gifts: new hope, new joy, and new life. The refrain from this Spiritual appears in our *Lift Up Your Hearts* hymnal (#99). Rollo Dilworth’s gospel style arrangement for three women’s voices invites us to sing with the angels: “Glory, glory to the Newborn King.”

The flowers on the chancel today are in loving memory of **Rev. Herman Keizer** from his wife, **Ardis Keizer**. Five years ago Herman met his Savior whose name he proclaimed all his days.
