**Epiphany is the liturgical season from Christmastide to Lent.** During this time we focus on Jesus Christ, the Savior, who is the manifestation of God’s light in our dark and sin-filled world. As we grow in our knowledge of God’s redemptive acts through Jesus Christ, we are called to respond by bringing the light of the gospel to our neighborhoods and the world. These concepts are reflected in the symbol of the Trinity and the gold and white colors used in the banners and paraments.

### **Music at LaGrave: (11:00)**

Rollo Dilworth (b. 1970) is a young African-American composer whose music draws from spiritual and gospel

styles. Like many pieces in this genre, the refrain of *Lay Your Healing Hands upon Me* contains syncopated rhythms and textual repetition, while the verse is in call and response format in which a soloist’s text tells a story and the choir’s text offers responsive commentary. The anthem also quotes an African-American spiritual; *I Know the Lord Has Laid His Hands on Me*.
