By doing so, we find life, experience deep spiritual growth, and live grateful lives.

#### **Music at LaGrave**

The solo anthem *He Looked Beyond My Sin* is a collaboration between an American gospel singer's text, an English Folk tune, and an American arranger's creativity. Dottie Rambo (1934-2008) was a gospel singer and songwriter whose claim to fame in the 60s and 70s was her hit song *He Looked Beyond My Sin (Fault) and Saw My Need.* Dottie's daughter happens to be country singer Reba McIntire. Vocalist Jonathan Bratt Carle's father, David, is a gifted arranger and received permission to set Dottie's text to the beloved English folk tune, *O Danny Boy (Londonderry Air)*. This piece is appropriately placed in this morning's service of confession.
