LaGrave had called Dr. Huizenga as their missionary partner, and for 25 years faithfully pledged their financial and spiritual support. **The flowers on the chancel today** are given in loving memory and recognition of that day 103 years ago by the **Huizenga Family**. Thanks be to God for his faithfulness through all generations.
