Music at LaGrave

Growing up with two brothers, English poet and artist Christina Rossetti (1830-1894) was exposed to high art and literature from a young age. Over half of her writings are devotional in nature. She wrote two Christmas carol texts, *Love Came Down at Christmas* and *In the Bleak Midwinter*. Twelve years after Rosetti's death, English luminary Gustav Holst composed a beautiful hymn tune for the latter poem, still sung around the world. We hear this morning an arrangement of that hymn tune for three women's voices.

Today is Christmas Eve Sunday and the beginning of Christmastide. Christmastide is the twelve days following Christmas day. The sanctuary colors of Christmastide are white, purple, and gold. White symbolizes the purity and holiness of Jesus Christ, Son of God. Yet, he is also Jesus Christ, born of a woman, being both God and human. As a human person, Jesus was like us in every respect except he was without sin. Therefore, he was able to take our sins upon himself and redeem us. Purple represents the birth of Jesus but also foreshadows his coming death. All of the colors combine against the background of gold. Gold represents the kingship of Jesus and also our joy and celebration of the Christmas season.

The Advent Wreath is a circle which reminds of God who is eternal with no beginning and no end. The four ring candles represent the light of God coming into the world. They also represent the period of waiting during the four Sundays of Advent. The pink candle symbolizes the joy of the eminent coming of the Christ. The white, center candle is the Christ candle. It reminds us that the incarnation is the heart of the Christmas season. Jesus, the light of the world, comes into the darkness of our lives and brings new life and hope.

The flowers on the chancel today are given in loving memory of Rev. Herman Keizer from his wife, Ardis Keizer. Six years ago Herman met his Savior whose name he proclaimed all his days.

The December special offering is for Oakdale Neighbors, a neighborhood development organization providing youth mentoring and advocacy, tax preparation, financial classes and neighborhood business development assistance.

Today at 4pm we will have our family Christmas service. This family-friendly service will include lots of singing, the lighting of the Christ candle, and a simple message about Jesus as the Prince of Peace. Reverend Jonker will lead the service.

At 11pm we will enjoy our annual Christmas Eve candlelight service. The chancel choir will sing, the bell choir will ring, and Reverend Jonker will lead the service. The theme of the service is Dona Nobis Pacem - a Latin prayer meaning, 'Grant Us Peace.' Come early if you want a seat.
