The liturgical season of Easter is the fifty days from Easter to Pentecost. The white, gold, and crystals used in the paraments and banners reflect the glory of the resurrection. Jesus Christ, the King of kings, has won the victory over sin and death!

Music at LaGrave (8:40)

Thomas Frederick Handel Candlyn (1892-1964) was an English organist who spent his career at two Episcopal parishes in New York. He wrote over 200 works for use in the church, both choral and organ. His anthem *Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies* remains a staple in the repertoire of Episcopal churches today. Candlyn's style is steeped in the English tradition, making use of rich harmonies, soaring melodic lines, and a substantial organ accompaniment. The anthem's text is by Charles Wesley who wrote over 6000 hymns. Candlyn paints Wesley's text at the outset with ascending melodic lines on the words "skies" and "arise."

The flowers on the chancel today are given in memory of Rev. James Molenbeek who went to be with Jesus on April 20, 2022. Jim had many interests, hobbies and served his Lord throughout his Ministry and after. He is lovingly remembered as a Husband, Father, Grandfather, Uncle, Cousin and Friend. He is dearly missed by his family Sue Molenbeek, Dan, Julie, Natalie and Megan Molenbeek, Matthew and Victoria Molenbeek. We believe the promises of the Easter Resurrection and we will be with him again someday.
