Rev. Dr. Cornelius Plantinga Jr. is the former president of Calvin Theological Seminary, and before that served as the Dean of the Chapel at Calvin University. Neal currently works with the Calvin Institute for Christian Worship.

Ordinary Time, the longest liturgical season, is a time of spiritual growth. The banners are hung in the diptych form but instead of being attached together they are side by side yet separated. Both the banners and paraments reflect concepts from Isaiah 12:2-3. We come to know the Lord more deeply as our strength and our salvation. With joy we grow spiritually by being rooted in God's word.

Music at LaGrave:

Born to Czechoslovakian parents, Jaroslav J. Vajda (1919-2008) was an American hymnist associated with the Lutheran Church. He was an ordained minister and served churches in Pennsylvania and Indiana. His hymn texts have found their way into many hymnals. His 1968 hymn *Now the Silence* is a unique, one-stanza hymn which lists several of the elements of worship: silence, speech, kneeling, welcome, hearing the Word, communion, celebration, singing, forgiveness, the presence of the Spirit, and the Father's blessing.

The July special offering is for Westminster Food Pantry. The downtown food pantry provides an emergency supply of food and personal care items to people in need while also promoting self-sufficiency through referrals and education.
