The Advent Banners and Parament reflect the message of Isaiah 9:6, "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light." In Advent we celebrate the coming of Jesus Christ. Jesus, the light of the world, breaks through the world's darkness with his glory bringing to us the light of salvation.

The Advent Wreath is a circle which reminds us that God is eternal with no beginning and no end. The four ring candles represent the light of God coming into the world. They also represent the four Sundays of waiting during Advent. The one pink candle symbolizes the joy of the immanent coming of the Christ. The white, center candle is the Christ candle. It reminds us that the incarnation is the heart of the Christmas season. Jesus, the light of the world, comes into the darkness of our lives and brings new life and hope.

Music at LaGrave: In keeping with the spirit of the baroque masterpiece *Messiah*, today's offertory is a transcription of the

Pastoral Symphony from that revered oratorio, and the postlude, composed by Mormon Tabernacle organist Richard Elliott, combines the hymns Joy to the World and Ode to Joy with excerpts of For unto Us a Child Is Born and the Hallelujah Chorus.

The flowers on the chancel today are given in loving memory of Rev. Herman Keizer from his wife, Ardis Keizer. Seven years ago Herman met his Savior whose name he proclaimed all his days.

The December special offering is for Camp Tall Turf. Camp Tall Turf is a 40-year-old Christian camp offering leadership training and mentoring for inner city and greater Grand Rapids youth.

This evening we will have our annual Christmas Carol Sing. The service will be led by Drs. Visser and Hobgood, accompanied by the 58-member LaGrave Orchestra.
