Epiphany is the liturgical season from Christmastide to

Lent. During this time we focus on Jesus Christ, the Savior, who is the manifestation of God's light in our dark and sin-filled world. As we grow in our knowledge of God's redemptive acts through Jesus Christ, we are called to respond by bringing the light of the gospel to our neighborhoods and the world. These concepts are reflected in the symbol of the Trinity and the gold and white colors used in the banners and paraments.

Music at LaGrave (8:40)

Charles Coffin, in his 1736 hymn text *What Star Is This, with Beams So Bright?*, recounts the fulfillment of the prophecy "From Jacob shall a star proceed" (Num. 24:17), the visit of the Magi to the newborn King, and calls us to follow the star, seek Christ's face, and let our lives shine with God's love. This Epiphany carol is set to music by American composer Howard Helvey, who includes a beautiful violin part which plays the main theme of the vocal solo throughout the anthem.

The flowers on the chancel today are given by Marge Hoogeboom, in loving memory of my husband Tom Hoogeboom, who the Lord blessed me with for 53 years of marriage.

The January special offering is for Inner City Christian Federation (ICCF) which provides housing opportunities, home ownership counseling, home repairs and maintenance for families who otherwise cannot afford a home.
