We welcome the Dordt University Concert Choir under the direction of Dr. Ryan Smit to worship this morning. The choir is currently on their spring tour throughout Iowa, Michigan, and Ontario, Canada. Dordt organ and piano students will also participate in the prelude and postlude.

Lent is the liturgical season beginning with Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. The ash-permeated sackcloth reminds us

of our human mortality and our need for repentance and reconciliation with God. The ash sackcloth against the royal purple cloth symbolizes the suffering and sorrow that Jesus the King bore for the sin in our broken world and our own lives.

Music at LaGrave: The choir shares two communion anthems during the sacrament, one by French luminary Olivier Messiaen (1908-1992) set to a Latin text from the traditional Roman Catholic church liturgy, and another by contemporary American composer Kyle Pederson, who arranged the traditional spiritual *Were You There?* These anthems draw us near to the cross and the passion of Christ as we are nourished at the table.

The flowers on the chancel today are dedicated to **Harry and Helen Boersma** in honor of their love and dedication to the Lord and their family. We miss them. **Matt and Jaclyn Alcumbrack Family**

The March special offering is for **God’s Kitchen**. God’s Kitchen is part of Catholic Charities under the Diocese of Grand Rapids. They served over 175,000 meals to people downtown Grand Rapids last year.
